- If you want to influence C'town, the open positions in CNIA are the way to do it.


HPLU - Nicole Seekely:

- 152 Berean Ave: Owners applied to HPLU recommends sending letter recommending it not be approved for demolition.
- 692 Kirkwood Porch Roof Addition: Eric Fiere With heavy rain the upper deck over historic part of building leaks. The debris that falls collects and blocks the drainage under deck. They want to build a structure over the deck. It will run the rain away, minimalist structure. Shared photo of the structure. HPLU does not support because it does not fit the historic profile. All similar structures are flat roof. A through roof drain structure was recommended. Motion was made to support HPLE decision to not support a structure over the historic portion unless it conforms to the same structure as *Sweet Cheats* extension of the hip roof for the whole length of the roof and mimics the structure of Sweet Cheats and it was passed. 1 nay.

This past month, viewers of Windy City Rehab (HGTV) witnessed the tv show hostess – Alison Victoria – purchase loft E412 at The Stacks for \$490k. Soon there after, her team got to work doing what they do, reimagining living spaces. The loft now allegedly offers 1950sqft.

Ms. Victoria converted a small-ish upstairs closet and bathroom and added custom walk-through storage, an oversized shower, and a freestanding tub. Downstairs, she added a custom banquette surrounded by quasi-period appropriate built-in shelving. Butterflies & Beer





C'town Chows: Edgewood Avenue



Cabbagetown is the home of – and surrounded by – some of the tastiest eats in Atlanta. As new restaurants are popping up in and around the neighborhood, we're touring the hottest spots, as well as the tried-and-true joints, and telling you all about it from the perspective of a couple of bona fide food-enthusiasts.

On a typical weekday, you can find us daydreaming about where we're grabbing drinks and food that weekend.

On this particular Friday night, we walked over to Edgewood Ave's newest brewhouse where they're slinging brewskies fresh

from the tap – **Biggerstaff** Brewing Company. After we worked up a thirst, the hoppy Redus West Coast IPA and crisp Pauline Pilsner were exactly what we needed. As for the IPA. citrus notes permeated through this cold one, making this juicy IPA perfect for anyone who's not exclusively about the hops. On a lighter note, the Pilsner went down easy and lived up to its classic reputation.

After our thirst was quenched, hunger was setting in. Time for dinner! You might've seen a new

spot make an appearance right next door - Adele's Atlanta. Hailing from our neighboring food-loving city, Nashville, Adele's offers an inviting interior, friendly service and a delectable menu. With all the hype, we had to check it out.

The cocktails are vibrant and refreshing, particularly the 'Over Yonder' made with Gin, Lime, Elderflower, Tonic and something called Blackberry Moonshine (not totally sure what it is, but it was delicious). We also went off-menu and ordered a Mezcal Margarita, which was

just the right amount of sour and sweet with a smoky finish. We then ordered an appetizer to start – the Bruschetta served with Housemade Ricotta and Red Onion Jam, which did not disappoint in the flavor department. The fluffy bread was the perfect vehicle to hold the silky, savory ricotta - making for an ideal amusebouche to get the meal started.

Moving onto entrees, we ordered the Gnocchi cooked in Cured Lemon, Caper Cream Sauce, Pecorino and Italian Crumbs, as well as the Roasted Chicken dressed with Herb Salsa Verde. The Gnocchi was a real standout dish – pillow-like dumplings so comforting they could put you to sleep, although you'd wake right back up from the brightening finish of the lemon. The Roasted Chicken left something to be desired since it was not accompanied by a side,

> which led our gaze to the Pimento Mac n' Cheese topped with Breadcrumbs. For a sleeper side item listed as a shareable, it under-promised but surely over-delivered.

We opted out of dessert and instead dropped in at Staplehouse Market next door for a night-cap as they're now open late on Fridays and Saturdays until 10p. We grabbed a bottle of wine and sipped and laughed out on the cozy patio until close (and if we were there any longer, the staff might've asked us to grab a broom!).

If you're in need of a night out with pals or looking for a cool date night scene, this Edgewood Ave trifecta really knows how to deliver. We'll definitely be going back and look forward to trying new things. As for the next stop on our food tour, you'll be hearing from us soon.

Cabbagetown has it's fair share of weirdness and funk. But step outside of our friendly confines, and things get even weirder and funkier. Don't believe us? Read on...

Florida man. For Alexander Leszczynski, 22, of North Redington Beach, Florida, it wasn't enough to be charged with wire fraud, bank fraud, and money laundering, the Tampa Bay Times reported. The U.S. Attorney's Office in Tampa claimed Leszczynski might face up to 30 years in prison for making up charitable entities to receive Payroll Protection Plan loans totaling almost \$200,000 and trying to deposit fake checks to the tune of \$2.7M, among other schemes. But wait, there's more! "When he discovered that the money had been frozen, he attempted to have it released by producing a fabricated pardon purportedly signed by former President Donald Trump," the U.S. Attorney's Office said in a news release. One of Leszczynski's fake charities was trying to seize control of two properties that belonged to Jeffrey Epstein, the disgraced financier who died in prison while awaiting trial on sex-trafficking charges. Leszczynski is being held without bail at the Pinellas County Jail.

Handy? Ayumi Takada, 37, of Tokyo, has been compared to Elastigirl from "The Incredibles" because of her incredibly elastic earlobes. Oddity Central reports that Ayumi can stretch her earlobes up to about 1.5 inches – enough to wrap them around a selfie stick, a calligraphy brush, or the shaft of an umbrella. But the real coup de grace came when officers finally caught up to her and she threw a fake snake at them. Laprade was booked and held on \$90,000 bond.

Tasty? Students at Johns Hopkins University are putting their education to good use. The students have invented Tastee Tape for their school's Engineering Design Day. They hope their invention will help make their favorite foods less messy by taping burritos, tacos and other dishes closed, keeping the fillings inside. "All its ingredients are safe to consume, are food-grade, and are common food and dietary additives," said team member Tyler Guarino. They are in the process of obtaining a patent.

Cats of Cabbagetown The Don of C'town

Anyone who has ever waited for a burger outside Little's will have become acquainted with Dexter, arguably Cabbagetown's most popular resident and one of Atlanta's most famous cats. You've seen him holding court in his special "Cat Goes Here" spot, but do you really know anything about Dexter? To learn more, we spoke with Tad Porter, longtime resident of Cabbagetown and Dexter's current owner. Both Dexter and Tad live on Carroll Street – Dexter in front of Little's, and Tad, above.

Tad, tell us a little about Dexter.

"Dexter is between 15 and 17 years old. Contrary to (semi-)popular belief, Dexter is a fixed boy. He originally lived next door to Little's with Russell, but did not get along with Russell's girlfriend's German Shepherd. After that, he was a mostly outdoor cat, living along Carroll Street and getting lots of food and attention from neighbors and visitors. He had a friend named Dirk that also lived on Carroll Street, but they fought a lot because Dirk would try to eat all of Dexter's food. You may have noticed a lot of black cats in the neighborhood. They could be members of Dexter's family."

How did he end up with you?

"In the winter of 2016, I noticed that Dexter was coughing a little and seemed a little cold. I took him to the vet, and it turned out he had asthma, so I invited him to stay inside at night. After that, he became a nighttime indoor cat."

Tell us something we may not know about Dexter.

"Dexter was once cat-napped! The story is that a visitor to the 'hood likely thought he was a street cat and tried to take him home. They made it as far as Iswald St, which happens to be the location of a large colony of cats. Dexter was found stuck in a fence and had been attacked by another cat! I took him to the vet, and at first they thought maybe he would need to have his leg amputated. It turned out to be fine, but Dexter did lose the tip of his tail in the incident. Nina Cunard helped set up a GoFundMe to raise money to pay for Dexter's medical bills." If you see Dexter outside Little's, please do not try to take him home. He has a home and is very well fed. Walk Like an Egyptian Onion



When I hear the Bangles sing "Walk Like an Egyptian" I think of punky-funky 80s fashions and the two-dimensional paintings adorning the tombs of the pharaohs. And I think of onions – Egyptian walking onions.

Egyptian walking onion is a type of multiplying onion that forms bulblets (small bulbs) on top of its stalks where you expect to find a cluster of flowers. The bulblets may even have small stalks of their own giving the plants an interesting Medusa appearance. Sometimes they will have a few small, white flowers, too.

As these bulblets grow and as the stalk holding them ages and withers, the bulblets weigh down the stalk and take root where they touch the ground. In a sense they "walk" across the garden. This is their main way of reproducing. In more than four decades of growing them, I have never seen them set seed. Their reproduction is effective, as I often have to thin them out. If I let every bulblet sprout, I'd be overrun with Egyptian walkers.

The onions can be eaten fresh in the spring as scallions, the leaves can be chopped and used as a topping and the bulblets can be pickled. All parts can be used in kimchi. Raw Egyptian walking onions can be strong and hot, but sautéing or other cooking methods will reduce or moderate their heat.

However, in all my years of growing these onions, I have only eaten them a few times. Don't dislike them, I just think of them more as ornamentals than edibles. And truth be known, while I like growing what food I can, they are inferior to baby Vidalias. Due to their ornamental qualities I have them growing with daylilies, irises and other perennials and in pots with dianthus and violas. Their leaves are blue-green all winter, and the hollow stalks and leaves light up like jade lanterns when morning sun shines through them. And the tops are attractive as well as being a conversation starter.

If you want to plant them in a vegetable garden, I suggest you plant them with another perennial vegetable such a asparagus or tuck them into a corner instead of trying to grow them in rows. They also work well in an herb garden.

Egyptian walking onions will withstand a wide range of growing conditions and are almost as durable as the pyramids. Full sun or half shade is fine. They are not particular as to soil type, and fertilizer is not needed. They are drought tolerant, and supplemental water is rarely, if ever, required. If you are growing them for eating, however, keeping them from drying out in the spring while they are actively growing may reduce their heat and produce a more tender onion.


Not many commercial sources sell Egyptian walking onions. *Southern Exposure Seed Exchange* carries them, and *Burpee* did at one time. They are a classic pass-along plant that is handed from one gardener to another. That is how I got them, and I daresay that is how most people acquired them. You may see them referred to as "tree onion," "top onion," "perennial onion," "Egyptian tree onions" and "topsetting onion." Those may be common names elsewhere. I have only seen them in reference books. Egyptian walking onion is the only name I have heard.

One last thing, while the "walking" in the name is easily explained, "Egyptian" is not. No one is sure where these onions originated, although I like to think they are truly connected with the mystic land of the Nile.

WE DON'T NEED YOUR STINKIN' TOWER

When Jake and Nina Elsas heard about a plan to erect a 165ft.cell tower looming over Cabbagetown and Oakland Cemetery, they leaped into action.

They linked arms with The Atlanta Preservation Center, Easements Atlanta, Historic Oakland Cemetery, City of Atlanta Urban Design Commission, The Oakland Park Homeowners Association, Cabbagetown Neighborhood Improvement Association's Historical Preservation and Land Use Committee, City of Atlanta Neighborhood Planning Unit – N, The Stacks at Fulton Cotton Mill Lofts COA, and The Patch Works Art & History Center. A formidable ensemble... not unlike the final scene of *Avengers® Endgame*.

SaportaReport reported that Chamblee-based *CitySwitch* was proposing the 165ft monopole on *CSX* railroad land directly next to the *Oakland Cemetery*, *The Stacks*, and *Fulton Cotton Mill Lofts*, all are historic landmark properties. For the sake of comparison, the *WSB-TV* tower that looms over Freedom Parkway is 1,075ft tall.

CitySwitch consultant *RESCOM Environmental Corp* in April submitted a report to the state claiming the tower would have no visual impact on those sites or other nearby historic districts, including that of Martin Luther King Jr. Jake, Nina, and their small army, took issue with that claim as well as the lack of proper, accessible outreach to our public and adjacent property owners.

"Nina and I founded The Patch Works specifically to focus on preserving Cabbagetown's history. Our visual history is tremendously important, because it's such a rare neighborhood. There are very few inner-city mill town's left in the world that are as historically intact as Cabbagetown, especially since both the village and its mill still remain. Our smokestacks should ALWAYS be the tallest structures in the vicinity. In addition, next door to us is Oakland Cemetery, yet another rare historical gem. THEN, there's Old 4th Ward with MLK's National Park and also Grant Park to the south... every one of these historic neighborhoods and properties would be staring directly at this monstrosity, which would dwarf all other structures and redefine our skyline." Said Jake.

The Georgia Historic Preservation Division (HPD), a state agency, reviewed the project and in a May 5th letter to RESCOM, HPD Division Director Jennifer Dixon said the agency agrees with the critics.

Dixon wrote that "it is HPD's opinion that the tower, as proposed, will have an adverse effect on historic properties... due to the tower's incompatible height, looming visual nature, and close proximity to four [National Register of Historic Places] listed districts where the pastoral, park-like setting and low scale, low height late-nineteenth/early-twentieth century suburban residential development is a character-defining feature of their significance..."

Dixon said the developer now is required to propose alternatives to avoid or minimize the historic impacts, which could include anything from changing the design to picking another site. "As such, we look forward [to] commenting on those alternatives as soon as they are available," she wrote.

John Ruch and SaportaReport reported that Jamie Cochran-Smith, RESCOM's vice president of cultural resources, sent an email that same day to several groups designated as official commenters to the HPD to notify them of the decision. Cochran-Smith said CitySwitch is working on alternatives and the process could take "some time."

"This client does listen to local feedback, and they have changed or moved proposed towers in the past when possible," Cochran-Smith wrote. "Due to your concerns and comments, our client has been looking into better alternatives... Our client is working to see if there are any other alternatives that might work here."

Said Jake, "On April 19th, Nicole Seekely forwarded an email to the HPLU from Ian Michael Rogers (Executive Director of Easements Atlanta), asking if anyone wanted to tackle the issue. From that day until the submission date of May 5th, I got kinda cray cray... unsurprisingly! The thought of a 165' telecommunications tower going next to The Mill lit a freaking bonfire under my tuchus. I can't say exactly how many loooooong emails I wrote, probably three dozen or more. But... let me put it this way: on my first email, I included seven people. By my final email, I included thirty-four (thirty-six if counting the RESCOM reps)."

"Success" was achieved by the consistent sharing of information and ideas among all the collaborators, as well as moral support. Going up against Big Business is daunting, so it was important for everyone to assist one another. I know The Patch Works couldn't have done it without guidance from the APC and Easements Atlanta. Also, getting the word out to the public – loudly! – and confidently making a stand, helped tremendously... That being said, I must let you know that this monopole is still being discussed. Our efforts haven't stopped the tower in our area 100%, so we need to remain vigilant.

The proposal of the tower next to the cemetery and Cabbagetown triggered a state and federal review due to the proximity to historic properties. HPD told SaportaReport that it currently has no other cell tower projects under historic review within Atlanta.

Is one more Avengers® reference too much? Probably. Oh well. "Compromise where you can. Where you can't, don't. Even if everyone is telling you that something wrong is something right. 


