CNIA: General Meeting Minutes

Tuesday, April 9th, 2024, 7p. Meeting conducted by Marinangeles Gutierrez Rivera. Minutes by Lucy Perkins. Location: Cabbagetown Community Center.

1.Welcome - Marinangeles Gutierrez. 7:06p start time.

2. Review and Approval of March Minutes. New neighbor party, concert series, bake sale (performances and such!), Stacks Squares same day! Motion to approve - unanimous! Motion approved.
3. Atlanta Police Department Updates – Lt. Butler. Not present
4. City of Atlanta Council Person - Council Person Liliana Bakhtiari
a. On recess

5. Special Presentation: GDOT Design Review of Memorial Dr. Ron with Traffic Ops. Background - GDOT Safety Program (reduce fatalities and injuries). This project is part of the Atlanta Intown Multimodal Study. Roadway reconfiguration - remove lanes, add turn lanes and bike lanes. Two Projects: Resurfacing and safety project. Resurfacing - Ted Turner to Memorial (some already done). 8/31/2024 expected completion for resurfacing and road diet (and maybe bike barriers). 8/15/25 finished designs for raised elements and cycle track. Two-way cycle track needed instead of one on each side (narrower and can block it from cars). In C'town specifically, Boulevard to Pearl adding the two-way cycle and turn lane. C'town environment will not be affected. Partnering with MARTA - exploring raised cycle track at bus stop.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

1. *Q*: What kind of population and business growth does GDOT project – in our area – over the next ten years? 1.5% annual growth anticipated with bike traffic.

2. Q: Memorial and Blvd - there are many bottlenecks there will y'all work on syncing the lights to help with traffic? Signal operations team will be syncing and adjusting. No right on red to avoid pulling into cycle traffic. They will work with ATL on the bottleneck at Blvd. Moreland and Memorial is also being worked on to potentially fix bottleneck.

3. Q: Can we protect the bike lane at Memorial to not turn it into a right turn lane? There will be protection (concrete and vertical posts) 4. Q: Is there a map for cyclists? GDOT no, City of Atlanta yes.

They're working on it. There is a map of designated bike routes but not what type.

5. Q: Is there any risk of this getting the kibosh? No one has tried to stop so far. Delivering as resurfacing so to avoid public comment. There is operational data on traffic flow and they've been monitoring to make sure it doesn't get worse.

6. Q: Why no raised elements for bus stops? Worried that people will drive up on them. It's never been done.

7. Q: Changes to the speed limit? Crosswalks? There will be some but any between Blvd and Pearl might not be safe to create. This project will help people stay at 35 mph. **8.** *Q*: how do we request pedestrian beacon at Memorial? A: We can maybe get it done with a different project but adding to this project would delay it further. We can find a way. The driveways make it difficult to add the crosswalk.

9. Q: Sidewalks? No. Curb ramps, yes. There will be a future sidewalk extension but no sidewalk improvement planned right now.
10. Q: Can we get the raised elements? Yes but it may not be with THIS project.

6. Committee Reports

Community Center clean up happening. CI Election - looking to bring back executive director, a position lately gone, they'll vote next month. CNIA position for CI - treasurer role - Parth has been nominated to take that role. He wants to get involved and will get help from the previous treasurer. Background in finance. Motion to nominate Parth as treasurer role for CI- seconded - 16 in favor - unanimous!

7. Financial Report - Jack Cunningham, Treasurer. Budget was approved - no update.

8. John Dirga. Park update: Park Pride grant to fix up amphitheater - 3-1 match if we raise ^{\$}50,000. Work day was great and hours counted towards funds raised. Fundraising! Bake Sale on April 20th and a cupcake battle. Please volunteer - starts around 1p. Sign up on *cabbagetown.com/bake*. Many sponsors! Same day as Stacks Squares on the side of the cotton mill. May 11th artist talk - exhibit at Atlanta Contemporary - Artist talk from the artist and curator.

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STELLAR PERFORMERS

Amsonias are stars in my my garden in more ways than one. Their common name is "blue star" for their star-shaped, steelblue flowers. Besides bearing attractive flowers in a rare and welcome color, amsonias are stellar performers. These perennials are pest free, drought tolerant and easy to grow.

l grow two species – the Eastern blue star (*Amsonia tabernaemontana*) and the Arkansas blue star (*Amsonia hubrichtii*).

The Arkansas blue star is the more ornamental of the two due to its fine foliage. In summer its threadlike leaves sparkle after a light rain or heavy dew, and the plant becomes a mist of gold in autumn. The Eastern blue star is also colorful in the fall, but the overall effect is less dramatic. Eastern blue star is native to the eastern half of U.S. while Arkansas blue star is found in a much more limited range in Arkansas and Oklahoma. I also grow a hybrid of the two that occurred naturally in my garden. It bears characteristics of both parents. These two hybridize so readily it makes me wonder if they are actually one species.

Amsonias thrive in full sun to half shade, and average soil is fine with them. In fact, if too rich the plants may become lanky. I have one in the sidewalk planting strip in soil that appears to be a mix of clay and cinders peppered with bits of asphalt and concrete. It looks as happy as if sitting on a throne. And it is crowned with loads of flowers.

Since they are members of the same family as milkweeds and even exude milky sap when cut, I had hoped that, like milkweeds, my blue stars would also serve as host plants for monarch caterpillars. No such luck, but the flowers attract butterflies and bees.

A few good companion plants that bloom along with amsonias include copper iris, bearded irises, California poppies, rose campion, bletilla orchid and peonies. I saw an ideal pairing of Eastern columbine and Eastern blue star in front of a cinnamon fern at the Mordecai House in Raleigh. The combination of the red and yellow of the columbine with the blue of the amsonia was a perfect floral trio of primary colors.

There are other species of amsonia that you may want to try. There are also hybrids and named forms selected for particular qualities. I once included a pure white Eastern blue star in a garden I designed consisting of mainly of white flowers. It was perfect for that situation, but unless you have a special need or just want rarities, go with the blue. After all, there are so many more white flowers than blue ones. And at this stage, explaining to someone that I am growing a white blue star, requires more time than I want to give.

Pretty much everyone in C'town knows about the magical wonder that is lenChan's on Carroll Street, but what you MIGHT not know

that is JenChan's on Carroll Street, but what you MIGHT not know is that Emily, Jen (and Mik) are gearing up to open a new market in R'town... and we can't wait!

Mikkelson's Market will take over *The Urban Market Grocery Store* on Flat Shoals Avenue and everyone has their fingers crossed for a grand opening in July.

According to RoughDraftAtlanta.com, Mikkelson's Market is a very personal project for Emily. They named the market after her father who died earlier this year. It pays tribute to her family's Danish heritage through specialty items on the grab-and-go food menu.

"My dad owned restaurants, as did my mom. I've now lost both of them. Part of my grieving is throwing myself into work and opening this market in honor of my dad," Emily said. "I got my work ethic from my dad. You don't get days off when you own a restaurant. We even named our son Mikkelson. There's just something about passing down a legacy and knowledge and recipes in families."

What can we look forward to at Mikkelson's Market? Good

question. Em & Jen will sell prepared "plates of the day" from JenChan's and grab-and-go food like breakfast sandwiches, Hoisin duck and pints of smoked gouda mac and cheese. The market will also sell provisions such as smoked fish, other preserved goods, smørrebrød (Danish open-faced sandwiches) and aebleskivers (Danish pancake-like puffed pastries) based on Emily's greatgrandmother's recipe.

"The menu will rotate with the seasons, and we're very excited about opening up to more farm partners." Emily told RoughDraft.

What else? Em and Jen are hoping to sell boutique wines as part of the retail arm of the business. They are also looking into a *Shopify* website for online ordering.

"We want Mikkelson's to be for the neighborhood, including families who live here and want to bring their kids in for a root beer float or a Slushie while they pick up provisions for lunch or dinner," Emily said.

Get ready Reynoldstown! We think you are going to love the brand of hospitality that Em and Jen bring. We can't wait to see how a Danish culinary scene fuses with a smart, young, vibrant, and growing 'hood like R'town. "No one is rich enough to do without a neighbor." That's an old Danish proverb. Em and Jen can depend on us, and visa-versa. See ya' there.

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DIAMOND STREET PLAYERS: PRECIOUS JEWEL, PRICELESS TUNES

Diamond Street Players founder, Spencer Garn grew up in North Palm Beach, FL where he began taking piano lessons around the age of seven. He then played mostly punk-rock guitar in his teens and recorded on four-track cassette! His rock, funk & soul-jazz keyboard adventures with the Hammond organ began sometime in his early twenties when he was lugging a chopped Hammond M3 around, and at some point an old & heavy chopped CV organ for gigs.

Currently, he plays the Hammond SK2 on many gigs, has an A100 at home, a C3 at *Diamond Street Studios* (Atlanta, GA), his


In 2016 the musicians held a weekly Thursday night residency at *Little Vinyl Lounge*, which paid tribute to the groovy Hammond Organ sound of the late 60's era. Garn and company covered a variety of funky soul, jazz & boogaloo organ grinders from the era by artists ranging from *Lou Donaldson* to *Booker T. & The MG's* to *Jimmy McGriff* who released on record labels such as *Blue Note*, *Stax*, & *Prestige*.

After two 7" teasers already this year, The Diamond Street Players drop their debut self-titled LP this August 2nd, 2019. The album brings you ten delicious mid-and-uptempo grooves chock full of gritty and soulful Hammond organ instrumentals, backed up by the perennially hard-and-funky DSP rhythm section. Two vocal tracks round out the set, with *Amanda Joy* making her hypnotic vocal debut on *Million Miles*, and the powerhouse *Adryon de*

studio where he has also been a recording engineer and producer since around 2008.

His instrumental organ recordings have been licensed to TV shows, such as **Anthony Bourdain's "No Reservations"** and various other outlets, and he continues to write and record instrumentals which highlight the Hammond organ sound. His latest studio album, and studio house band, 'Diamond Street Players', released an LP of funkysoul driven tracks back in 2019 which highlights the Hammond organ sound.

Currently, he has a slew of new original recordings he's been working on with studio partner, *Tyler "Falcon" Greenwell* (drummer with *Tedeschi Trucks*



Leon (Orgone and *Matador! Soul Sounds*) bringing the OH, SO HEAVY How Many Lies, How Many Times to LP glory.

This studio band, led by organist & producer, Spencer Garn was recorded and mixed at *Gemco's Diamond Street Studios* in Atlanta, GA. If you thought the days of studio house bands (*Stax, Motown, Muscle Shoals*) were gone forever, then hop in and take a ride down Diamond Street with these players!

The first two singles, Million Miles (feat. Amanda Joy), and the timeless and timely dancefloor burner How *Many Lies, How Many Times*, were written and produced in conjunction with *Leo Black (The Dynamites)*,

Band), and local Atlanta studio musicians. They also are recording and producing many great artists from out of state as well as local Atlanta bands. Follow the Socials to check out new recordings from their various studio collaborations as well as new original material from Diamond Street Players in 2024.

When he's not in the studio or performing he shoots photography on Fujifilm cameras and lenses and DJI drones. Check out his links for more details about bands he's played with.

The Diamond Street Players are a five piece soulful ensemble lead by organist Spencer Garn. Born out of a six-month weekly residency in 2016, and his Little Five Points Studio, Diamond Street, the band features a rotating group of local Atlanta musicians he has worked with regularly over the years and has been recording new original songs with, primarily throughout 2017. and are on this full LP including Spencer Garn's blistering B-sides from those 45s, **Organ Workout** and **Murky Retrograde**.

Bada Dum Dum, the Players' own sing-along party anthem, needs no language-specific lyric for any super soul dance party to join in.

You get some old school New Orleans vibes on Clean Slate & Suzy's Boogaloo, and some Gemco-pedigree deep funk/soul instrumentals on Grease Gun, & Split the Difference. No dull moments on this LP, folks. Jump in that car on the cover and take that funky ride on wax.

DSP has a new album coming out to follow up the single released this year. The Jams will persist and please. Like a rare precious jewel past the rough stages into golden moments for music lovers and fans alike.

KROG STATION?

Unless you've been living under a boiler house, you've probably heard that Mayor Andre Dickens announced that Atlanta will build four new in-fill MARTA stations, and low-and-behold, one of them – according to the announcement – will be near the Krog Tunnel.

And – beyond that – not much more is known. No details like; how will we fund this, or when will we build this, or what will this look like. Seems like BIG details are still being worked out OR info is being dripped out strategically. We'll get to that later.

Absent of BIG details, I'll give it my best guess (pure speculation). If a Krog Station comes to fruition, I believe it will be an elevated station and cantilevered over Decatur Street or Dekalb Avenue. It will be smaller than most MARTA stations. It will probably have only one platform (on the north side of the tracks) and will necessitate the addition of a criss-crossing track (not a big deal).

Don't hold your breath. I am thinking the station won't open till sometime between 2031 and 2034. How will we fund it? Good question. Federal dollars will probably come into play, but a big bulk of the cost will probably fall on Atlanta taxpayers. Don't be surprised if Krog Station costs upwards of ^{\$}100 million.

Where, exactly? Our best guess is within two blocks – east or west – of the Krog Tunnel. Don't be surprised if some high density, transit-oriented developments (low to mid-rise apartments and condos) come along too. This kind of housing is generally considered a good thing, especially in a growing metropolis like Atlanta.

Is info being dripped out strategically? Maybe. Recently – reading between the lines – Mayor Andre seemed to shift from strongly behind Beltline rail transit, to something less definitive.

Will the four in-fill stations be built at the expense of Beltline rail transit? One can only speculate. But if this IS the case, The Mayor will undoubtedly face some very – understandably so – disappointed citizens. Promises were made, and breaking them is seldom good. Promising more low-income housing along with the four new stations MIGHT be a strategy for overcoming the disappointment. The Mayor may also be betting that CSX will sell Hulsey Yard in the next thirty years. If that's the case, then Krog Station suddenly becomes a no-brainer.
