

## Relay Bikes Are Here to Stay



When Jump officials announced earlier this month they'd be pulling their bright red, pedal-assisted e-bikes out of Atlanta, some vocal mobility advocates suspected the saturated e-scooter market was driving bike-share programs out of the city.

Another worry: Would the City of Atlanta's Relay bike program wither away once its contract expires next year, overtaken by the e-scooter craze?

A spokeswoman for *CycleHop*, the company that operates *Relay Bikes*, tells *Curbed Atlanta* the system is here to stay, and that it's due for a major upgrade.

"Relay Bike Share has no plans to discontinue the program," says Chelsea Davidoff. "On the contrary, we're working on upgrading the system and adding e-bikes next year."

Could the gap left by Jump bikes' departure be filled by a city-supported program? That remains to be seen. CycleHop's five-year contract with the City of Atlanta expires next year, but the company has renewal options, Davidoff says. "We are in it for the long term," she adds.

So when a new and improved Relay bike-share model is unveiled next year, it likely wouldn't fall under the purview of the City's new – and still very much up-for-debate – dockless vehicle regulations.

That means that when other dockless e-devices become inaccessible at 9p each night, Relay bikes could remain online.

Davidoff says it's crucial for a city to have a diverse mix of mobility

options, and that bicycles shouldn't be forgotten amid the frenzy over new technology.

"The reason bike-share contracts are important [is] it allows vendors to make longterm investments and cities to attract grants and allocate transit funds towards transportation projects, and offer an affordable service to the public," she says. "Most bike share programs require public support, as ridership alone doesn't cover the operating and capital costs."



Over the next few months, Atlanta's entire Relay bike fleet – it's unclear how many bikes are still operational, due to dated and struggling technology – will be overhauled with CycleHop's HOPR system, which uses electronic assistance.







### The Worst Year in Cabbagetown History



Throughout its history, Cabbagetown has seen its share of good times and bad times. Today's residents enjoy a convenient, intown location (at a price), and the area is largely gentrified. Believe me, it didn't come without its struggles!

An uncertain future of the now apparently abandoned *Hulsey Rail Yard* looms on the horizon. Still, the future looks promising. There was a time, though, when residents looked to the future with only fear and

distrust. Mama Patterson wound up moving back into her home in 1983, ending the "We Shall Not Be Moved" saga, but "the worst year ever" for Cabbagetown was about to present itself in 1984.

The world came crashing down upon the neighborhood that year with two separate events that seemed to signal its demise: The murder of 16-year-old David Samples by an Atlanta Police Officer and the city's approval of the Piggyback Facility. Both happened pretty much at the same time. Either of these events alone would have been rough, but together, they seemed to ring an end to the community's viability – perhaps forever.

A year or so earlier, three Cabbagetown youths had been convicted of the September 1981 kidnapping, robbing, beating and murder of a middle-aged lawyer in a homosexual sex-for-hire tryst that spiraled out of control. The only one over the age of 16, Ronnie Samples, was convicted of murder with a long sentence. His younger brother, David, seemed destined to be caught up in the seamy underworld of child prostitution and drug abuse that was endemic to the area.

The Atlanta Journal-Constitution ran a series of articles on the neighborhood's battle with poverty, despair, addiction and crime – much to the community's chagrin. The crime rate in Cabbagetown was reportedly double the city's average, the community squabbled over the collapsing building stock, bristled at the growing number of newcomers, and everything seemed to be devolving into chaos. Then, in the early morning hours of the first of August, an event unfolded at the corner of Memorial and Boulevard that thrust the community into the spotlight once again.

As an APD car rolled by, an intoxicated 16-year-old David lobbed an empty bottle at the patrol car. Of course the officer pulled over. David apparently lunged at the officer and was shot six times, expiring on the spot. The community was outraged, and the tragedy turned the focus on the city's policing policies. Though the officer was cleared of any wrongdoing, David's mother sued the city for wrongful death. The citywide focus on Cabbagetown over the next several years painted an incredibly negative view of the neighborhood and divided neighbors against one another depending upon their view of what had happened.

Then, as if to rub salt in their wounds, Mayor Andrew Young and the City Council approved the railroad's request to establish the "Piggyback" facility adjacent the site of the old Mill. Once again, the neighborhood was split over a controversial issue. It seemed to be devolving into anarchy – becoming an inner city ghetto with a bleak future.

The only "good thing" to come out of the David Samples tragedy was the establishment of the Citizens' Police Review Board, which is still in existence. Their mandate continues to be oversight and review of controversial citizen-police incidents. And the Piggyback facility, while intrusive and detrimental to the area's redevelopment, didn't decimate the area as its opponents had feared. It did generate a significant amount of "payoff" money in the form of the infamous "Piggyback fund," for better or worse. And the community successfully weathered both storms, prevailing in the long run.


